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Traditional Vasilopita Pie Cutting Event

This year all the elementary, middle and high school students participated in the traditional Vasilopita pie cutting event.

The Vasilopita is one of the main Greek traditions around New Year's and Christmas. Vasilopita is directly translated as "sweet bread of Basil" but is often baked as a cake. When baked, a coin is dropped in the batter just before it is put into the oven. Sweet flavoring is added to the Vasilopita to symbolize the eternal sweetness and joy of life, as well as the hope of a sweet and prosperous year filled with good health, liberty, and happiness for all who participate in the tradition.

The tradition takes place on New Year's Day when the senior member of the family cuts the cake into pieces, one for each member. The individual, who finds the coin in their piece, will be considered blessed for the year.

The tradition originated in the fourth century when Saint Basil the Great, a Bishop, wanted to help poorer people in his diocese. He recruited women to bake bread, and put gold coins in with the ingredients. These cakes would be distributed to families in need. This way he would help them while preserving their dignity.

The tradition is celebrated through all of January and is often done multiple times with friends and family. The Vasilopita is a beautiful tradition and a wonderful way to start the new year.

This year, Leo Gartzke from elementary school and Orlando Hales from middle/high school were the lucky ones who received a coin in their pie. They each received a 40 euro gift card to Publix.



Martin Luther King Jr. Day

On January 12, we honored Martin Luther King Jr. by watching a 45 minute video about his life.

On January 15, our school was closed to observe Martin Luther King Jr. Day. We learned that the acclaimed American civil rights activist and Baptist clergyman, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., was born in Atlanta, Georgia, on January 15, 1929. In the 1950s and 1960s, he was a key figure in the American civil rights movement. King is most recognized for his unwavering efforts to enhance African Americans' civil rights and his support of peaceful resistance to racial segregation. He coordinated a number of significant campaigns, including the March on Washington and the Montgomery Bus Boycott.

In 1963, he gave his iconic "I Have a Dream" speech, which outlined a vision of racial harmony and equality: "Now is the time to make justice a reality for all of God's children." To this day, it is still regarded as one of the finest and most influential speeches in American history. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the Civil Rights Act of 1964 were two important pieces of civil rights legislation that were passed as a result of MLK's leadership and dedication to justice. Even after his sudden and tragic death on April 4, 1968, Martin Luther King Jr. continues to stand as a testament to the struggle for social justice and racial rights in the United States.

What would you advise someone new to the school?


Take it easy. Don't overthink. Stick to your plan.

They created collages and cubist portraits.








Writing Corner


